The Richboro Methodist Episcopal Church

On October 22, 1857, members of a Presbyterian denomination under the leadership of Rev. Robert Morris of Newtown, purchased for \$300 from Sarah Leedom, one acre of land, "beginning at the southwest corner of the old Dutch Grave Wall, between Richborough and Addisville". On this land, they started building their church, the four walls and roof, but then abandoned the project.

On April 15, 1861, a deed of sale was executed between the trustees of this unfinished Presbyterian Church and the trustees of the Richborough Methodist Episcopalian congregation.

The dedicatory service of the Richboro Methodist Episcopal Church was held on September 19, 1861.

In a September 1914, church directory is a photo of Rev. Eugene B. Harshberger who was pastor at the Richboro Church and also served at the Penns Park Methodist Episcopal Church. In this directory is also a listing of members and their addresses, including my grandmother, Lena Weiss, Richboro, Pa, Eva Caffey, address, Tollgate, also Charles Schmerer, Tollgate, and Luella Krusen, Cemetery.


My Third and Last House

For the first 45 years of my life I was sure that I had lived in three of the oldest houses in Northampton Township. In the September 2001 issue of the "HISTORIA", I wrote about the home where I was born in "Highspire" north of Worthington Mill Road, with date stones 1743 and 1803. One was initialed J. C. and we often wondered if another John Cornell had built it (my father's name) but after much research, I found the builder's name was James Cummins. There was a difference between this house and the last house I lived in because upstairs you could not get from one level to the other. Apparently the bedroom over the kitchen was for the hired help and they could not enter the family's sleeping quarters. I was always glad that our last farmhouse had three steps and a door between levels as my son slept over the kitchen there.



One of the earliest houses in Richboro, was originally one room on each of four levels, with addition added later. I was married here in 1943. Now the Barber shop.

In another issue, May 2001, I wrote about an old house in Richboro where I lived from age ten until I married, which today is a barber shop. It had no date stone. It was purchased by the Gallaghers who opened up a candle shop. They researched its history and found that the original part of the house, all stone, was built about 1702 on land that had been granted by William Penn. to Thomas Groom in 1681.

The property had been reduced in size many times from its original 550 acres to its present half acre. It held 84 acres in 1836 when Enoch Addis lived in the house. In the beginning, the house consisted of a cellar--kitchen, main living room, a bedroom and an attic. A later frame addition made the home as our family knew it quite lovely. The Gallaghers uncovered a beautiful fireplace, which our family never knew existed.

I am now living in a modern home and I am back to Ivyland rural delivery which was also my address the first ten years of my life on 'Worthington Mill Road.

EDITH WILSON 1919-2006



It is with great sorrow that we announce the death of a longtime Richboro resident and Society member, Edith Wilson on September 30th, 2006. Edith had a failing heart and had been in and out of the hospital in the last few months. She died peacefully at St. Mary's Medical Center.

Born Edith B. Burrage, 87 years ago in State College, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Wilson was a resident of Richboro for the past 64 years. Penn State University was a tradition with Edith's family her father was a Professor of French at the University and she was a graduate of Penn State University in 1941 with her degree in music. She was a member of the Alpha Omicron PI Sorority.



After graduation, Edith taught in the Maryland School System, before coming to Bucks County in 1942. She taught at the Richboro School and at the Newtown School from 1942 to 1948, and later at Newtown Friends School, Newtown. Edith loved music and singing. After coming to Richboro she became a member of the Addisville Reformed Church, immediately joined the choir, and started playing the organ, which she did for well over 35 years before she retired in the late 1980. She not only loved her church but also loved music. She was active with the Women's Guild, the Annual Bazaar and other church organizations as well as the Parent Teacher Association of the Richboro School where her children attended, but her real passion was being beside her husband in his veterinary practice in Richboro for over 61 years.

Edith is the daughter of the late Leslie M. and Sigrid Larson Burrage; she is survived by her beloved husband of 61 years Dr. Cameron S. Wilson VMD.; and her loving children Charles C. Wilson, D.M.D. of Richboro and Suzanne W. Carpp, BS, MS, of Richboro; and her granddaughter, Emilie Carpp of Chapel Hill, N.C. where she is attending the University of North Carolina.

There was a memorial service for Edith on Tuesday October 3, 2006 at the Addisville Reformed Church, Richboro. Interment was in Union Cemetery Richboro. Flowers or contributions in her memory can be made to Addisville Reformed Church, 905 Second St. Pike, Richboro, PA., 18954.




- The Weir Family holiday card of their farm on Almshouse Road, taken by Harvey Weir, appeared on the front cover, as it does in this issue.
